


Neurolinguistic programming in residential youth work.

All of my work comes from the perspective of the 'problem paramedic.' A residential youth worker often acts as a first responder. Like paramedics, they might not witness the long-term outcomes of their interventions.

Their role is vital but inherently limited in shaping the complete recovery or developmental trajectory of the youth in their care.

Therefore, the emphasis is on making a positive, immediate impact using available tools and resources, similar to a paramedic's first-response approach.

Body Language

We covered Mirroring, Pacing, and Leading. I introduced my concept of the S.M.I.L.E. technique as a means to master most body language and communication techniques without conscious efforts.

Communication

We discussed recognizing sensory systems—visual, auditory, and kinesthetic—to improve communication.

02



S.M.A.R.T. Goals

We discussed the principles of goal-setting for ourselves and our youth. Additionally, we explored the 'EARS' concept—being a fan of the goal: Elicit, Amplify, Repeat, Start again.

03



Limiting Beliefs

identifying our own and those of others, understanding their origins, and exploring how we might change them. Could we alter these beliefs while remaining part of the young person's story?

Peer Pressure

Both we and our youth are subject to its incredible power, often following the crowd even when they are clearly wrong. We discussed how this could be applied in our work.
